

# Empowering Public Entities to Safeguard Against Threats with Federal Grants

In 2022, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced the creation of the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program (SLCGP) to help states, local governments, rural areas, tribes, and territories protect against cyber risks. SLCGP provides funding to eligible entities to address cybersecurity risks and threats to information systems owned or operated by, or on behalf of, state, local or territorial governments. SLCGP's goal is to improve the cybersecurity of critical infrastructure and the resilience of the services that those government entities provide to their communities.

## State Level Funding

Each state and territory receives a funding allocation as determined by the statutory formula. The State Administrative Agency (SAA) is the only entity eligible to apply for the SLCGP.
